that produces solutions to societal, economic and environmental issues. We teach Tennesseans in the places they live, work and play through hundreds of programs. Our efforts are based on local needs, research and a commitment to improve the quality of life.

Helping Vegetable Producers Tomatoes are the #1 crop in Grainger County. They bring in \$10 million

annually. Grainger has 650+ greenhouses and 475 acres devoted to tomatoes. Strawberries, onions, beans, peppers and many other crops are grown here as well. Extension helps producers make the right decisions about varieties, fertilizing, disease control, insect control, and marketing.



Vegetable

- Producer Grants FY 21-22: 8 producers received \$58,702.00 for vegetable production, and marketing.
- 14 fruit and vegetable producers implemented best management practices including site selection and development, variety/rootstock selection, pest/disease/weed identification, effective pesticide use, soil/plant tissue testing, research-based fertilization, and proper post-harvest handling resulting in improved profitability with an economic impact of \$91,000.00
- 12 new greenhouses built, resulting in \$30,000.00 increase profit.

Audit Committee Minutes

2.13.22

Members Present: James Acuff, Luke Stratton and Tina Davis.

Members Absent: Scott Wynn

Co-Chair- Tina Davis called meeting to order.

Committee members discussed revenue, expense and fund balance per 2021-2022 audit

Committee members discussed findings and corrective action plans for fiscal year ending 2021-2022.

Findings were noted in Office of County Mayor, office of Director of Schools, Office of Sheriff.

Mayor:

Finding 2022-001- Page 196 – The Sports and Recreation fund had a fund deficit on June 30, 2022. This deficit resulted from the recognition of a liability of \$140,856 associated with a ballfield construction contract. The contractor and county are currently in litigation to determine responsibility for the unfinished project. The recognition for the liability resulted in expenditures exceeding available funds.

Management Response – I concur with the finding. The contractor did submit payment application totaling \$140,856 after the county declared contractor default on the ballfield construction contract.

<u>Corrective Action plan</u>: We are in the process of completing a grant replacement contract for the remaining funds held by the state. Once the contract is executed and the remaining funds are released, the fund deficit will be corrected.

Director of Schools:

Finding 2022-02 Page -196 – Deficiencies were noted in payments made to bus drivers.

- A. At least five full-time maintenance employees, received compensation for driving a bus while simultaneously receiving compensation for regular duties.
- B. These employees also received an \$8000 bonus for driving buses in addition to regular compensation and additional compensation as substitute bus drivers. No documentation was found where bonus payments were approved by School Board.

Management Response: We concur with these findings.

Item A. The board will implement policies and procedures to ensure employees do not simultaneously receive compensation for driving a bus and performing their regular duties.

Item B. Salary schedules and compensation for all employees, including employees who currently drive bus routes in addition to their primary, regular employment duties, were approved at a special call School Board meeting on July 26, 2022. Any changes in compensation will be approved by the Board before becoming effective.

Corrective Action Plan:

The board will implement policies and procedures to ensure employees do not simultaneously receive compensation for driving a bus and performing their regular duties. The policies and procedures will be prepared in consultation with the Board's Legal Counsel.

Salary schedules and compensation for all employees, including employees who currently drive bus routes in addition to their primary, regular employment duties, were approved at a special call School

Board meeting on July 26, 2022. Any changes in compensation will be approved by the Board before becoming effective.

Finding 2022-003 Page 197 – Purchase Orders were not issued properly in some instances.

Purchase orders were issued after invoice dates in four of 23 applicable purchases (sample size of 36 disbursements)

Management Response: We concur with these findings.

To ensure that all Grainger County Board of Education personnel recognize the importance of the timely completion of purchase orders prior to invoice dates, the board will implement the following revised policy 2.808. Purchase Orders and Contracts to now include the following additional provision:

Purchase orders <u>must</u> be issued prior to a purchase. The person pulling the purchase order must note his/her name and from whom the product is being purchased when the request for a purchase order is made. All other necessary items must be completed and returned to the necessary personnel prior to the purchase being made. The board reserves the right to decline reimbursement should a purchase be made prior to issuance of a purchase order.

Corrective Action Plan:

Revised Board Policy 2.808 - Purchase orders <u>must</u> be issued prior to a purchase. The person pulling the purchase order must note his/her name and from whom the product is being purchased when the request for a purchase order is made. All other necessary items must be completed and returned to the necessary personnel prior to the purchase being made. The board reserves the right to decline reimbursement should a purchase be made prior to issuance of a purchase order. The Board will also require all personnel with

purchasing authority to be trained on the proper procedure for requesting and completing a purchase order.

Sheriff:

Finding 2022-04 Page -198 – The Sheriff's office did not file State prisoner board bills for reimbursement timely.

Management Response: We concur with the with the finding.

Due to personnel shortages certain paperwork and filings were neglected and were only being done as time permitted. For the period in question, Grainger County's approved budget was only \$150,000 as estimated revenue for State Prisoner Board. During this period a total of \$209,430 was received, resulting in and excess revenue of \$59, 430. The finding did not result in a revenue deficit for this period. Budgeted revenue was exceeded during the period.

Auditor's rebuttal:

While the budgeted revenue amount was met and exceeded, the point is that the failure of the sheriff's department staff to file the reimbursement requests for housing state inmates resulted in the county not receiving \$71,300 timely. These funds could have been earning interest; thereby decreasing the burden on the taxpayers of Grainger County.

Corrective Action Plan:

We concur with the finding and our planned corrective action is to process and submit the State Prisoner Board Bills for reimbursement within a timely manner.

Finding 2022-05 Page -199 – The Sheriff did not obtain a letter of agreement of court decree to authorize deputy hires.

We concur with the finding. In December 2021, Grainger County Commission appropriated for one dollar (\$1.00) an hour raises for each

employee. The sheriff's department budget, which was adopted by Grainger County Commission on August 8, 2022, included compensation totaling \$1,978,156. The approved budget for 2022-23 does not include sufficient funding in the employee compensation line items. Legal representation did not have time to prepare litigation before the deadline in filing, which is 30 days according to the statute. The total amount included in the projected employee compensation totaled approximately \$125,000.

Corrective Action plan:

We concur with this finding and our planned corrective action is to process and sign the letter of agreement if the agreement and funding is appropriate. If funding is not appropriate salary suit will be filed. Legal representation has been retained for next year's compensation agreement and funding request.

Upon a motion by <u>James Acuff</u> and seconded by <u>Luke Stratton</u> the committee voted to continue with the comptroller's fraud reporting process for employees, taxpayers, or other citizens may confidentially report suspected illegal, improper, wasteful or fraudulent activity under provisions of T.C.A. 9-3-406.







Full disclosure...... I forgot that I had prepared this document before the December Commission meeting.

Below is breakdown of Monthly O&M costs:

- Rental Fee \$0. Typically, we include a screenings/debris container in the screen bid. A bagging system will also be evaluated. The bagging system would be purchased with the screen.
- Power Cost \$30/month. The drive unit is less than 1 HP. Monthly power cost should be minimal.
- Water (for spray wash) \$30/month. Water usage should be less than 2,000 gallons/month. I'm not sure of the exact minimum water rate – I'm assuming minimum monthly bill is around \$30
- Pickup and Disposal Cost \$90/month. Pickup and Disposal cost is the most difficult cost to forecast as we will not know the volume of debris until the system is in operation.

The construction drawings will need to be approved by TDEC.


